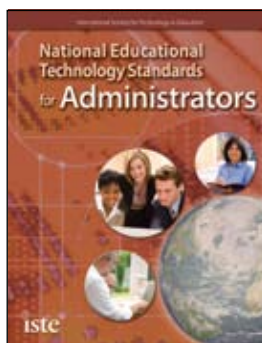
Get Your Free Computing Careers Kit
